



Oak

Oaks are stately trees and can have beautiful fall color. Oaks are an excellent street and shade tree as they have great urban adaptability, drought tolerance and are moderately fast growing. Oaks tend to prefer well-drained soil and produce small acorns loved by deer and squirrels.

At maturity they can reach 40' – 60' tall with a 40' – 60' spread.

Plant in full sun.



Maple

Maple trees can bring color to your landscape year-round. Green stems turn red, yellow and brown in winter, new leaves are red-tinged, turning to green. Fall color may be deep red or yellow.

Fast growing and tolerant of many soils. Great shade tree.

At maturity can grow 40' to 60' tall with a 40' spread.

Plant in full sun.



Chinese Pistache

Chinese Pistache is a small to medium-sized tree native to central and western China. It is hardy in Oklahoma, can withstand harsh conditions and poor quality soils

It can grow up to 30' tall with a 25' – 35' spread. The leaves are dark green and deciduous, but may become yellow to red in the fall. The Pistache is a great street tree and is resistance to insect and disease problems. Plant in full sun.



Loblolly Pine

One of the fastest growing southern pines, this tree is used as a quick-screen in many landscapes. This North American native has dark green needles and narrow, red-brown, often-paired cones that are three to six inches long. Grows in a wide variety of soils and is drought tolerant. 60'-100' height with 25-35' spread.

Plant in full sun.



Redbud

Oklahoma's State Tree, the Redbud may have rosy pink, dark pink, white or lavender flowers which usually appear in early April. Reddish-purple leaves change to dark green, then to yellow. Redbud's form a spreading, graceful crown as they mature.

At maturity can grow to 25' to 30' tall with a 20' to 30' spread. Medium growth rate.

Plant in full sun or light shade. Partial shade preferred in windy, dry areas.
