



Residential Water Rates Step increase vs. Gradual increase


Gradual increase would have produced over \$5.5 million additional revenue during this time resulting in overall lower present rates




2002 Water Rates





Residential Water Reclamation Rates Step increase vs. Gradual increase


Gradual increase would have produced over \$12.0 million additional revenue during this time resulting in overall lower present rates








Residential Water Reclamation Monthly charge for 10,000 gallons
